- Have you created an inventory of assets, including real estate, personal property, financial accounts, and business interests?
- Have you notified financial institutions of the individual's passing and to secure the accounts?
- Is there a life insurance policy?
- Are there digital assets such as domain names, intellectual property, or cryptocurrency holdings that require evaluation or transfer?
- If the deceased had pets, have arrangements been made for their care and future ownership?
- Are there items of historical significance, artifacts, or memorabilia that need appraisal?
- Did the deceased own timeshares or vacation properties? Have their values been determined?
- Have you addressed tax obligations, including income taxes and potential estate taxes?
- Have you paid the property taxes for the year?
